





Scripture Reading

Stoic philosophy, founded in Athens by Zeno of Citium in the early 3rd century BCE, teaches that the path to a virtuous and fulfilling life is through practicing self-control, reason, and emotional resilience.

It emphasizes four core virtues: wisdom, courage, justice, and temperance.





Scripture Reading

Stoics believe that by focusing on what we can control—our thoughts, actions, and attitudes—and accepting what we cannot, like external events or outcomes, we can achieve inner tranquility (ataraxia) and live in harmony with nature.


Key figures like Epictetus, Seneca, and Marcus Aurelius stressed that happiness comes from aligning with rational principles and maintaining equanimity in the face of life's challenges, viewing obstacles as opportunities for growth.



18. Douglas Adams (1952-2001)

Principle: Douglas Adams, author of The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy, veiled philosphy as comedy and taught that humor, curiosity, and imagination are powerful tools for navigating an absurd universe. His writings emphasize the importance of crafting one's own meaning, embracing adaptability, and fostering unity through shared wonder.

Relevance: Adams's blend of rational inquiry and faith in human potential aligns with the Church's mission to harmonize reason and faith. His teachings encourage individuals to write their own lives with creativity, find purpose through exploration, transform through wonder, and elevate humanity by celebrating interconnectedness.



17. Richard Feynman (1918-1988)


Principle: Richard Feynman's development of quantum electrodynamics (QED) and his iconic Feynman diagrams revolutionized our understanding of particle interactions at the Planck-length scale, revealing the probabilistic, pixelated nature of reality. His path integral formulation posits that particles explore all possible trajectories, collapsing into definite states upon observation, aligning with the church's view of a vibrating, observer-dependent universe.

Relevance: Feynman's work supports the Church of Faith and Reason's belief in a pixelated reality, where each Planck-length pixel represents a quantum event vibrating in superposition until interacted with, as depicted in the Parable of Double Dutch Jump Rope. His diagrams provide a visual language for the quantum dance, mirroring the church's emphasis on understanding the universe's structure through reason, while his intuitive approach to science reflects the integration of faith and curiosity in seeking universal truths.



All: literally part of the same one great we."


